The MCSC serves as the administrator for AmeriCorps*State funding in Missouri by awarding monetary grants and providing technical assistance and support.

Composition

The MCSC is composed of 15-25 Governor-appointed Commissioners with expertise in areas of community service and volunteerism. Commissioners and staff work together to encourage all Missourians to give of themselves to make Missouri a better place to live for all of its residents. In this annual report, we highlight some of those efforts.

Four standing committees serve to carry out the functions of the commission. Those committees are Service & Development, Program, Public Relations and the Executive Committee. Service & Development promotes volunteerism through awards and recognitions. This committee is also responsible for locating funds to carry out their mission. The Program Committee reviews applications and presents their recommendations for funding to the full commission for voting. The Public Relations committee is responsible for promoting volunteerism, and National Service in Missouri.

In addition to commissioners, five staff located within the Missouri Department of Economic Development, perform the daily operations to provide training, programmatic and fiscal oversight, and the necessary technical assistance to ensure the success of its sub-grantees. Staff consists of an Executive Director, Chief Field Program Officer, two Field Program Officers, and one Program Development and Events Coordinator.



<u>AmeriCorps St. Louis</u> <u>St. Louis Partners – Education Corps</u> Partnership for Youth, Inc.

Members serve as a team, partnered with teachers, in grades K-8 in the inner city of St. Louis. Teams focus on literacy and communication skills; often using experiential learning and service learning as tools. Members also address other issues i.e. – individual tutoring, developing peer tutoring systems, afterschool and summer expanded learning, parental involvement, and assistance to ESL (English as a Second Language) and bilingual students.



<u>AmeriCorps St. Louis</u> <u>St. Louis Partners – Safety Service Corps</u> Partnership for Youth, Inc.

Members serve in teams with police, schools, and neighborhood agencies. This program emphasizes community problem solving, conflict resolution, and *mentoring youth. Community* mediation and neighborhood stabilization are also a focus. A special unit of the Safety Service Corps serves as an emergency response team to the American Red Cross, FEMA, US Forest and National Park Services, as well as state and local disaster agencies.



<u>College Bound</u> <u>College Bound AmeriCorps</u>

College Bound's mission is to provide promising high school students from under-resourced backgrounds with the academic enrichment, social supports and life skills needed to apply, matriculate and succeed in four-year colleges. AmeriCorps members serve as College Coaches or as a Program Leader. The College Coaches mentor high school students through the processes of preparing for and applying to college, and the Program Leader coordinates enrichment programming such as service learning, cultural enrichment, and leadership programs for College Bound students.



Towards the end of the semester, AmeriCorps members celebrate by assembling care packages for students heading off to college. The collegians receive these great packages from College Bound just before finals!



<u>Grace Hill Settlement Home</u> Grace Hill AmeriCorps Trail Rangers – St. Louis

AmeriCorps Trail Rangers assist in the development of the St. Louis Riverfront Trail and Columbia Bottom Conservation Area to strengthen the *impoverished* North City riverside communities, reinforce community responsibility, and provide educational and financial opportunities to its residents. Rangers continue to maintain the Trail area and provide services to over 13,500 annual Trail users. Rangers also give presentations that cover the topics of native plants, history, recycling, and their role.

<u>Purdy R-II School District</u> Purdy Reading Coaches

Members provide reading *intervention to at-risk Kindergarten – 5th grade* students who are reading below grade level through daily oneon-one tutoring sessions; focusing on skills and strategies to break the trend of reading failure. This is an "AmeriCorps Reading Coaches" model project that includes the English as a Second Language component to help bridge the language barrier for the growing Hispanic population of this community. Coaches also hold special community events.

<u>Seneca R-7 School District</u> <u>Seneca AmeriCorps Program</u>

Seneca AmeriCorps members serve in the Elementary and Middle Schools as Reading Coaches and as mentors to students identified as at-risk in the after-school programs. Members serve on the local capacity building committee to increase the effectiveness of community service as well as recruit volunteers. All AmeriCorps Members are required to become certified in CPR and First Aid. Seneca members can be seen to the right as they receive this training.





<u>University of Missouri – Columbia & Kansas City</u> Jumpstart Missouri

Jumpstart recruits and trains achievement-oriented college students to deliver an innovative early education program via yéar-long one-to-one relationships. Jumpstart college student Corps Members are paired with pre-school children from low-income backgrounds in the classroom setting and work together on language, literacy, social, and initiative skills for one year. Through this relationship, Jumpstart inspires children to learn, adults to teach, families to get involved, and communities to progress together. Jumpstart is working toward the day when every child in America enters school prepared to succeed.



<u>Eldon R-I School District</u> PAVE AmeriCorps Tutoring Program

PAVE AmeriCorps Members provide one-on-one tutoring to at-risk students in the Eldon R-I School District. Tutoring in communication arts, reading and math occurs during the school day at five campuses and includes Kindergarten through 12th grade students as well as students enrolled in the Mustang Academy. Members recruit and work with community and parent volunteers to enhance the services provided to at-risk students.



<u>Missouri River Communities Network</u> <u>Missouri Stream Team AmeriCorps Project</u>

The Missouri Stream Teams AmeriCorps Project (MSTAP) works to recruit, train and involve the 58,000 volunteer Stream Team Members in Missouri to adopt local streams and work on water quality activities in their local areas. Activities include: Water Quality Monitoring, litter pick ups, storm drain stenciling, educational presentations, outreach to new teams, and other environmentally related activities.



<u>Waynesville R-VI School District</u> AmeriCorps Waynesville

The AmeriCorps Waynesville project is designed to provide academic support to K-8 students at all district schools. The program is based on providing service to students who are at greatest risk of school failure. The program provides tutoring and intervention to students in communication arts, reading and math.

<u>Boys & Girls Clubs of Greater Kansas City</u> <u>Project Learn</u>

By building capacity through the service of AmeriCorps Members and community partners, The Boys & Girls Club of Greater Kansas City will reach additional youth in need through Project Learn, Deepening Impact, and Communication Arts Tutoring. These programs are designed to give school-age youth access to academic support away from school; improve the ability to learn; boost academic self-esteem; and improve performance in standardized testing and overall school performance.

<u>Harvesters- The Community Food Network</u> AmeriCorps Community Outreach – Kansas City

Members serve as Community *Outreach Specialists in several key* areas of Harvesters' mission. Each *Member is assigned to volunteer* services, food drives, or nutrition education. As the only food bank in Kansas City, Harvesters seeks to increase the amount of food and services that can be provided to those in need. Members contribute to the overall mission by increasing the quality and quantity of volunteers and food drives, and by educating lowincome clients about healthy eating on a limited budget.

St. Joseph Youth Alliance

It is the goal of the St. Joseph Youth Alliance and its partners to reduce substance use and abuse among youth and to strengthen collaboration among community partners through the development and implementation of expanded services for youth. This will be done through blending existing prevention efforts with the developmental asset philosophy. This marriage creates a community-building strategy that has the potential to complement, strengthen, and expand substance use prevention efforts. AmeriCorps Members are placed with partnering organizations to develop and implement multi-faceted strategies designed to increase developmental assets and reduce the likelihood of substance use and abuse among youths.





<u>UMKC-Institute for Human Development</u> Community Support Navigators

The Missouri Community Service Commission contracts with Missouri's University Center on Excellence for Developmental Disabilities which is housed within the University of Missouri-Kansas City, Institute for Human Development (IHD) to assist in identifying strategies for recruitment and successful service completion involving people with disabilities.

IHD provides outreach to the disability community

- to promote service opportunities,
- to work with local sponsor sites to increase their awareness,
- to develop capacity for members with disabilities to serve,
- to provide training to programs on "People First Language", disability etiquette, and inclusive recruitment,
- to disseminate information to individuals with disabilities who express an interest in serving,
- and to continue to enforce Dr. King's philosophy that "Everyone can be great because everyone can serve".

Over 5,000 individuals with disabilities, family members, key supporters and professionals at 20 events received information on how ALL people can serve, not only in AmeriCorps, but also in other streams of National Service.



<u>UMKC-Institute for Human Development</u> Community Support Navigators

UMKC-IHD, along with its partners the Missouri Planning Council and local Senate Bill 40 Boards developed a multi-site program "Community Support Navigators", the purpose of which is to increase the productivity, independence, inclusion, and self-determination of individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. AmeriCorps Members in this program mentor individuals with developmental disabilities and their families to access and navigate needed resources, support access to existing generic community programs, and support the development of self-advocacy and leadership opportunities.





<u>Poplar Bluff's Promise</u> Butler Co. Community Resource Council

Members address 2 primary areas of community need; 1) strengthening the community in order to reduce rates of juvenile crime and 2) assisting in the areas of disaster response and preparedness. Members conduct after-school learning activities, tutor students, increase program enrollment and recruit volunteers to serve. Members serve in three school districts, two Head Start programs, after-school programs, Scouting, a domestic violence shelter, and the Adult Education and Literacy program.

<u>Bootheel Youth Museum, Inc.</u> <u>Southeast Missouri Project Learning Experiences</u> <u>(SMPLE)</u>

The goal of the Bootheel Youth Museum (BYM) Southeast Missouri Project Learning Experiences (SMPLE) AmeriCorps program is to provide hands-on activities which strengthen the educational foundation of children. BYM SMPLE AmeriCorps Members provide educational enrichment activities throughout Southeast Missouri in area schools, with community organizations and for museum quests. SMPLE is a collaborative partnership between the Bootheel Youth Museum and Lincoln University Cooperative Extension.




Return on Investment

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


Baldcypress (Taxonium Distichum)






Financial Impact of Volunteering

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





