# Letter from the Missouri Community Service Commission

#### Dear Friends,

Since 1994 the Missouri Community Service Commission (MCSC) has helped build a sense of community throughout the state of Missouri by encouraging volunteerism and by providing AmeriCorps grants to local communities.

The MCSC receives funding from the Corporation for National and Community Service located in Washington, DC. These funds enable local communities the opportunity to implement AmeriCorps programs in their geographical areas by recruiting AmeriCorps Members. AmeriCorps Members serve by providing direct services; addressing the most pressing local civic needs in their communities and neighborhoods in areas of Disaster Services, Economic Opportunity, Education, Environmental Stewardship, Healthy Futures and Veterans and Military Families.

In 2011-12, twenty-two (22) organizations provided such services in Missouri. Of these twenty-two thirteen (13) provided programs that addressed the area of education through tutoring, early childhood intervention, hands-on scientific experiments, and college entrance and success. Three programs served to provide disaster response, relief and mitigation. These programs responded to disasters, not only in Missouri, but across the United States of America. One program served in the area of environmental stewardship by removing debris and replacing invasive plants with Missouri native plants. They also provided assistance and safety supervision to visitors of a bicycle trail near downtown St. Louis. Other programs provided food and nutritional education to those in need, while another offered services to refugees; assisting them in getting settled in a new country. Still other programs served to prevent child abuse and to treat all forms of child abuse. Another program provided counseling for Medicare beneficiaries regarding their benefits and the availability of financial assistance. Lastly, another program was able to recruit spouses of veterans to serve as tutors to children during and after school. The Commission is very proud of its diversified portfolio of programs that, not only served in a variety of focus areas, but also served in various geographical areas across the state as you will see in the geographical presentation later on in this report.

## **OVERVIEW**

The Missouri Community Service Commission was created as a result of the National and Community Service Act drafted by a bipartisan coalition of Members of Congress in June of 1993. The bill was later signed into law on September 21, 1993. The legislation created the Corporation for National and Community Service to administer AmeriCorps, Learn and Serve America, and the existing national service programs of VISTA and Senior Corps.

The Missouri Community Service Commission was created by the Missouri Legislature in 1994.

The Commission is housed within the Missouri Department of Economic Development.

The Commission, by Statute, is composed of 15-25 commissioners appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.

The MCSC serves as the administrator for AmeriCorps State funding in Missouri by awarding monetary grants and providing technical assistance and support to its sub-grantees.

## American Red Cross: Prevent, Prepare, Respond

#### Program Director: Kristofer "Luke" Bolz

This AmeriCorps program meets the needs of underserved people in the rural areas of Southern Missouri. Members serve within specific counties to: recruit new disaster relief volunteers to tend to the needs of those displaced by natural or man-made disasters; teach life-saving skills such as CPR, First Aid, and Disaster Preparedness to their communities; and to strengthen relationships and partnerships with many disaster related organizations to improve the services delivered to those affected by disasters. Through this program, communities in Southern Missouri will be revitalized with a spirit of service to their neighbors, and will be better prepared when disaster strikes.



### AmeriCorps St. Louis Education Corps

#### **Program Director: Kathleen Becherer**

Approximately 40 Full-Time Members serve in teams of 4-6, assigned to one of 9 elementary schools. Teams focus on early reading skills through intensive one-onone tutoring. Each Member tutors 8-10 students for the entire school year, in grades K-3rd, who are already behind in reading readiness or reading. Members also facilitate after-school programming and events on weeknights and weekends. They offer 3 weeks of preservice training and 1 full day of in-service every other week and during days that schools are closed. It is not uncommon that Members serve 10-hour days. The vast majority of Members are college graduates who go on to teaching or graduate school upon completion of the term(s) of service. 1-2 Members are invited to spend a 3rd year in a leadership/fellowship role with the program each year.



## AmeriCorps St. Louis Safety Service Corps

Approximately 35 Full-Time Members serve in teams to prepare for and respond to disasters across Missouri and, by invitation, to other states. Since its inception in 1994, this Emergency Response Team (ERT) has deployed to disasters in more than 50 Missouri counties and 30 States. During non-disaster times, Members serve in conservation corps across Missouri as well as in Montana during July and August. For the majority of years, much more time is spent in conservation service than for disasters. The Safety Service Corps partners with the Missouri Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, the United Way, FEMA, SEMA, US Forest, as well as state and local disaster agencies and other State Commissions and Emergency Managers. It is not uncommon for Members to serve over 2,000 hours over the course of their term of service. 1-3 Members are invited to spend a  $3^{rd}$  year in a leadership/fellowship with the program each year.

## AmeriCorps Waynesville

Program Director: Dr. Kim Hawk

AmeriCorps Waynesville Members serve alongside teachers in the Waynesville R-VI School District to provide reading and mathematics tutoring to students who are struggling academically. Members also serve at the Club TIGER afterschool program, where they provide academic assistance, health and wellness activities, and club sponsorship to elementary and middle school students. Waynesville, Missouri is the home of Fort Leonard Wood, a United States Army Installation Base. This places the program at a strategic advantage to recruit spouses of active duty military men and women who serve as tutors in the AmeriCorps Waynesville program.



## AmeriCorps Poplar Bluff's Promise

### **Program Director: Rebecca Winters**

Members address improving academic achievement among at-risk youth in Butler County. Members conduct after-school learning activities, tutor students, increase program enrollment and recruit volunteers to serve. Members serve in two school districts, four Head Start programs, the local Volunteer Center and the Boys and Girls Club after-school programs.



## Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Missouri

#### **Program Director: Kerrie Bloss**

The Central Missouri Mentoring Partnership Project trains AmeriCorps Members to serve sideby-side with Big Brothers Big Sisters of Central Missouri mentors and staff to serve more at-risk children who have educational needs. AmeriCorps Members will recruit 600 mentors in Columbia, Mexico and Moberly who will serve with children from 23 elementary and middle schools. Members will recruit and coordinate volunteers, paying special attention to training the Big Brothers/Sisters to assist their Little's in their academic performance. The Big/Little matches may be in either the Community-Based or School-Based programs.



## Bootheel Youth Museum SMPLE

### **Program Director: Patsy Reublin**

The goal of the Bootheel Youth Museum (BYM) Southeast Missouri **Project Learning Experiences** (SMPLE) AmeriCorps program is to provide hands-on activities, through scientific experiments, which strengthen the educational foundation of children. BYM SMPLE AmeriCorps Members provide educational enrichment activities throughout Southeast Missouri in area schools, with community organizations and for museum quests. SMPLE is a collaborative partnership between the Bootheel Youth Museum and Lincoln University Cooperative Extension.



### Child Abuse Prevention Association (CAPA AmeriCorps)

#### **Program Director: Melody Morgan**

CAPA's mission is to prevent and treat all forms of child abuse by creating changes in individuals, families and society that strengthen relationships and promote healing. Some CAPA Members, who are all senior level Master's students in a clinical counseling degree, provide free therapeutic counseling services to children and families who have experienced abuse or related traumas. Other Members, who are senior level Bachelor of Social Work students, provide weekly in-home health education and case-management for high risk families with infant and toddler children. Lastly, they serve the community by providing prevention educational activities all across the Kansas City metro area. These activities most often take the form of safety skill building workshops for kids, parenting classes and psycho-educational groups.



Community Leaders Assisting the Insured of Missouri AmeriCorps Program (CLAIM AmeriCorps)

Program Director: Jim Day

Members provide counseling for Medicare beneficiaries, their family members and caregivers. This counseling is related to Medicare benefits and the availability of financial assistance programs. Members also educate beneficiaries and others on Medicare matters, promote the CLAIM program and related services and recruit additional volunteers. This statewide program expands the reach of the CLAIM program and improves access to services for seniors and disabled citizens of Missouri.



## College Bound AmeriCorps

#### **Program Director: Katie Bench**

College Bound's mission is to provide promising high school students from under-resourced backgrounds with the academic enrichment, social supports and life skills needed to apply, matriculate and succeed in four-year colleges and the workforce. AmeriCorps Members serve either as a College or Persistence Coach. The College Coaches mentor high school students through the processes of preparing for and applying to college; Persistence Coaches support college students as they pursue their bachelor's degree.



## Grace Hill Settlement House

#### **Program Director: Gold Wise**

AmeriCorps Members serve with families and support Settlement House staff to develop stronger neighborhoods and strengthen families by providing capacity to overwhelmed social service institutions, with the end result of strengthening both the community and families. The AmeriCorps project role is two-fold: 1) to ensure positive life changes for persons in need and crisis through the successful execution of case management plans set by agency professional staff and supported by AmeriCorps Members; and 2) to support successful school experiences leading to increased high school graduations and attendance at institutions of higher education.



## Grace Hill Trail Rang<u>ers</u>

#### **Program Director: Gold Wise**

AmeriCorps Trail Rangers assist in the lead development of the St. Louis Riverfront Trail and neighborhood connections to strengthen impoverished North City riverside communities, reinforce community responsibility, and provide educational and financial opportunities to its residents. Rangers continue to maintain the Trail area and provide services to over 13,500 annual Trail users. Rangers also give presentations that cover the topic of native plants, history, recycling, and their role.



## Harvesters -The Community Food Network

Harvester's mission is to feed hungry people today and work to end hunger tomorrow. Through a network of 600+ agencies, children, families, and seniors are fed throughout a 26-county region. Members serve in key areas, including: volunteer services, food drives, outreach, and nutrition education. By engaging the community, Members increase awareness about hunger issues, secure perishable and nonperishable food items, and ensure volunteer support in acquiring and distributing donations quickly to those in need. Members also provide children and adults who receive food assistance with nutrition classes, resources and cooking ideas to enable them to make healthy lifestyle choices.

## International Institute of Metropolitan St. Louis

#### **Program Director: Jane Knirr**

In the International Institute of St. Louis Client Services program, AmeriCorps Members meet the needs of clients, while enriching their own lives, by assisting in providing adjustment services to help refugees rebuild their lives, integrate into their new communities, and become selfsufficient as soon as possible. Depending on their assignment, Members meet and greet families at the airport; conduct orientations; assist clients with completing applications; link clients to services and programs; schedule appointments; coordinate activities; recruit, assess and enroll clients in programs; teach life skills, home management, job preparation and farming/marketing classes; assist clients in job searches; and recruit volunteers.



## Jumpstart Missouri – Columbia & Kansas City

#### Program Director(s): Chrissie Bennett (Columbia) Silvina Munita (Kansas City)

To combat the crisis in early education, Jumpstart joins together dedicated college students, called Corps members, and pre-school children from low-income communities. During the course of a school year, Jumpstart Corps members utilize Jumpstart's high-quality early education programming to help young children develop the language, literacy and social skills essential for success in kindergarten and in life. Through this relationship, Jumpstart inspires children to learn, adults to teach, families to get involved, and communities to progress together. Jumpstart is working toward the day every child in America enters school prepared to succeed.



## Missouri College Advising Corps

#### Program Director: Dr. Beth Tankersley-Bankhead

The Missouri College Advising Corps (MCAC) helps Missouri students gain access to college. Headquartered at the University of Missouri Columbia, MCAC is one of 10 inaugural corps in the national consortium of now 19 corps. MCAC is a full-time, nonprofit college-access advising program that helps high school and community college students understand that they can complete a college degree, find their "best fit" post-secondary institution, and navigate the process of applying for admission and financial aid. MCAC advisers are intensively trained, at both the state and national levels, to serve in their role and provided resources to plan and facilitate college-planning workshops (e.g., FAFSA completion, financial literacy, completing college admissions) as well as to take students on campus tours so that students can experience college life and "see" themselves as belonging and succeeding there.



### PAVE AmeriCorps

#### **Program Director: Daphney Partridge**

PAVE AmeriCorps Members provide one-on-one and small group tutoring to at-risk students in the Eldon R-I School District. Tutoring in communication arts, reading and math occurs at four campuses and includes 4th through 12th grade students as well as students enrolled in the Mustang Academy. Members mobilize and support community and parent volunteers to enhance community involvement in the school and expand services provided to at-risk students.



### Purdy Reading Coaches

#### **Program Director: Renae Neill**

AmeriCorps Members provide literacy based tutoring to Kindergarten through Fourth grade students. A varied approach is used which includes one-on-one tutoring as well as small group sessions. AmeriCorps Members form an integral part of the district-wide "ResponseTo Intervention" (RTI) program. The "Vision Intervention Program" (VIP) allows Members to address students who struggle with reading because of vision issues. Traditional one-on-one tutoring is provided for students reading below grade level while students who are already reading at or above grade level take part in small group enrichment activities.



## Seneca R-7 AmeriCorps

#### Program Director: Kim Wilson

Seneca AmeriCorps Members serve in the Elementary School and Middle School as Reading Coaches and as mentors to students identified as at risk in the after-school programs. Members will also serve on the local capacity building committee to increase the effectiveness of community service as well as recruit volunteers.



### UMKC Institute for Human Development Community Support Navigators

#### Program Director: Jane St. John

The Missouri Community Service Commission contracts with Missouri's University Center on Excellence for Developmental Disabilities, which is housed within the University of Missouri-Kansas City. The Institute for Human Development (IHD) helps to assist in identifying strategies for recruitment and successful service completion involving people with disabilities. IHD provides outreach to the disabled community by promoting service opportunities, working with local sponsor sites to increase awareness, developing capacity for Members with disabilities to serve, etc. Over 5,000 individuals with disabilities, family members, key supports and professionals at 20 events received information on how ALL people can serve, not only in AmeriCorps, but also in other streams of National Service.



### Safety Service Corps Joplin Recovery Project incorporated as Partnership for Youth

#### **Program Director: Bruce Bailey**

AmeriCorps Members support extended involvement in the City of Joplin, Missouri for continuing recovery efforts. The City has loaned the program a municipal building to use as an on-going hub where continued efforts are put forth to coordinate and manage volunteers, donations, homeowner work requests and collaborate on public recovery projects. Objectives of the program are: to maintain a homeowner intake system which prioritizes special needs cases, link with casework management and match resources to those families; assist with job placement of displaced workers; collaborate with the City on a variety of *municipal/public projects that relate to* rebuilding parks and developing trails and other green spaces; assist in organizing, gathering, tracking and soliciting donations that are able to assist in the rebuilding efforts; and act as a conduit for volunteer engagement in the long-term recovery process.



### Wyman Center AmeriCorps

#### **Program Director: Deborah Morley**

Wyman's mission is to enable teens from disadvantaged circumstances to lead successful lives and build strong communities. Our vision is to foster communities where every teen is expected and supported to thrive in life, work and learning so that they may become economically self-sufficient, leaders in their communities and, ultimately, break the cycle of poverty. AmeriCorps Members serve teens in the Teen Leadership (TLP) and Teen Outreach Programs (TOP). Additionally, one Member serves in the role of Community Service Learning Coordinator and supports both programs by searching out and developing relationships with community agencies who will host Service Learning projects for WymanTeens.

Funding is provided to the Missouri Community Service Commission by the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) and from the State of Missouri's General Revenue (GR) fund.

### Value of Volunteer Time

Volunteers are recruited by AmeriCorps Members as well as through other methods. 122,437 volunteers, including those directly recruited by AmeriCorps Members, participated in service projects and/or disaster relief projects associated with MCSC programs/sub-grantees in 2011-2012. These volunteers served a total of 840,962 hours. Based on the Independent Sector, the national value of volunteer time is \$21.79 per hour or a total value of **\$18,324,561**.

# A TRIBUTE TO THE VOLUNTEERS

At 5:41 P.M. on May 22, 2011, an EF-5 tornado ripped through Cunningham Park and the greater Toplin area, leaving a path of death and destruction one mile wide by six miles long in its wake. Over 160 people perished in the storm. What immediately followed in staggering numbers and through personal accounts is "The Miracle of the Human Spirit."

The Miracle of the Human Spirit symbolizes the incredible outpouring of volunteers who have lifed Joplin out of the rubble. Countless volunteers from all walks of life have offered themselves to the Joplin effort without request, serving as a reminder of the overwhelming power of human generosity and the steadfast tenacity to rebuild the once broken city.

This tribute embodies the volunteers' determination through four rippling garden walls, representing Joplin's ongoing rescue, recovery, demolition, and rebirth. Several elements within the tribute - bronzed artifacts, a mosaic of remnants, a volunteer statue, and the emblematic wristband - represent the volunteers' unprecedented response. Joplin and its residents are stermally graterful to those heroes, the volunteers' unprecedented response.

#### 2012 National Service Impact Award — Waynesville AmeriCorps

This award was sponsored and chosen by the Corporation for National and Community Service. It was presented at the National Conference on Volunteerism and Service in Chicago, Illinois.

Missouri AmeriCorps programs received three of the nine national awards presented.

The transient nature of military life can make life difficult for students in military families, and many are stationed at Fort Leonard Wood for less than two years or experience parental deployment. They often have challenges with making new friends, fitting into social groups, and connecting with the community.

The rural Waynesville School District in Missouri encompasses the Fort Leonard Wood Military Installation, a training facility. Seventy percent of its students are military impacted families and in some schools, more than 50 percent of the student population changes annually. AmeriCorps and VISTA teams have partnered with Learn and Serve America to create a comprehensive after-school program for Waynesville schools to help the students stay on course academically.

The program continues during the summer, as students receive individualized assistance through the summer school program. Forty VISTA Summer Associates and AmeriCorps NCCC members partner with year-long AmeriCorps members to offer tutoring during school and to provide unique educational enrichment opportunities after school including camping, interactive science experiments, museum trips, leadership camps, fitness activities, and service-learning projects.

AmeriCorps members provide tutoring and academic support to 1,696 students throughout the school day and lead more than 400 students in afterschool programs. Meanwhile, VISTA members work behind the scenes to assess the needs of each program, establish clubs, create workshops for parents and students, and secure grant funding.



#### 2012 National Service Impact Award – AmeriCorps St. Louis Safety Service Corps

This award was sponsored and chosen by the Corporation for National and Community Service. It was presented at the National Conference on Volunteerism and Service in Chicago, Illinois.

The Safety Service Corps, commonly known as the Emergency Response Team (ERT) answered the call time and time again after natural disasters scarred communities across the Midwest in 2011 and into 2012. From the record-setting devastation of the EF-5 tornado that struck Joplin, to the massive floods that covered southeast and northwest Missouri and flowed into surrounding states, the 35 full-time AmeriCorps Members traveled across the state and region to come to the aid of those in the path of these destructive forces of nature.

Some ERT Members initially focus on critical safety needs assisting with search and rescue, distribution of life-sustaining supplies, and outreach to special needs families. At the same time, other Members collaborate with community leaders to effectively manage volunteers, coordinate donations, and develop an effective approach for recovery.

In Joplin alone, ERT Members coordinated more than 75,000 volunteers to complete 2,200 homeowner requests. ERT Members documented volunteer hours and the use of donated equipment contributed an economic value of over \$17.8 million, off-setting the City of Joplin and the state of Missouri's required match for federal disaster funds.
